My team and I launched an initiative to fight climate change and secure our prosperity by working with local groups.

I passed many youthful summers running wild through the forest. My father taught his daughters how to survive in the woods. As a young girl you think nothing of dipping into an icy lake on the first warm day of spring. Still today it's in nature that I feel most grounded and at home. I remember a particularly dark moment at 14 where everything seemed so desperate. As I gazed over the river valley a calming wind rushed through the birch, and I did not feel so alone. We think of nature as our mother, because she can heal our dark thoughts and invisible wounds. Our children and their children must enjoy mother nature's splendour and powers of rejuvenation. I don't want them to associate her with the wrath of storms, floods and fires. That's why my team and I launched an initiative for a Green and Prosperous Pontiac. We need to protect the great outdoors upon which Canada and our future is built.

Extreme flooding in British Columbia follows on natural disasters in our communities—Canadians appreciate the threat of climate change. Yet few communities are prepared for our transition to a low-carbon future. We must act, but how? 
The government is investing \$914,150 over five years to support the centre's workshops through the Veteran and Family Well-Being Fund.



• The first National Day of Truth and Reconciliation in Kitigan Zibi


