# Protecting Gatineau Park: A Big Step for a Green and Prosperous Outaouais

One of my proudest achievements in Parliament is Bill S-289, a Bill I introduced with Senator Rosa Galvez to give Gatineau Park the legal protections it needs.

With input from the Kitigan Zibi community, environmental groups, local municipalities, and the NCC, this bill protects Gatineau Park's natural beauty for all Canadians, securing its boundaries and strengthening collaboration with the NCC, the Algonquin Anishinabeg Nation, and surrounding communities.

Protecting Gatineau Park is not just about conservation; it is about supporting our local economy and quality of life. Each year, Gatineau Park attracts 2.6 million visitors, bringing \$184 million to our local communities and supporting nearly 5,000 jobs. Gatineau Park's contribution already rivals that of many protected areas. By giving it legal protection, we can boost its appeal as a sustainable destination for ecotourism, opening new opportunities for economic growth across our region.

We are already seeing how investments in our parks pay off, like the 2022 federal investment of \$100,000 in **31-Mile Lake Regional Park** in the municipalities of Déléage, Bouchette and Gracefield. This funding helped enhance facilities and attract more visitors.

## Protecting Our Land, Building Our Future

I am proud of my work alongside the Kitigan Zibi community, regional elected representatives, environmental groups, and devoted citizens to protect the rich biodiversity of our beautiful Outaouais region. With shared commitment and support, we secured a \$2 million investment from our government for the Kidjimānināñ project, meaning "in a canoe, together." Led by the Kitigan Zibi community, this initiative aims to protect key biodiversity hotspots across the Outaouais region by 2030.

Our economy is deeply rooted in the strength of our natural infrastructure. By investing in conservation, we are not only preserving these spaces but creating economic opportunities. Protected areas draw tourism, create jobs, and build resilience. This approach also provides long-term certainty for housing developers and the forestry industry.

## The Gatineau-Ottawa Tramway: On Track for a Sustainable Future!

In response to population growth, the Gatineau-Ottawa tramway is essential to meeting mobility needs while improving quality of life and reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Supported by robust funding, this project aims to provide sustainable and efficient transportation between Gatineau and Ottawa.

I am extremely proud of the work accomplished in collaboration with Mayor Maude Marquis-Bissonnette and the Coalition S'Allier pour le Tramway.

Thanks to our perseverance, the government announced, in its December 16 economic statement, full funding of \$31 million for preliminary studies on the Ottawa portion of the tramway, which will cross the Ottawa River via the Portage Bridge.

This funding adds to the \$65 million already allocated federally for studies on the Quebec portion.

The 24 km tramway network, connecting Gatineau's west end to downtown Ottawa, will transport up to 5,000 people per hour, per direction. This modern infrastructure will significantly reduce urban congestion, a major issue in our city. In Gatineau, where 44% of greenhouse gas emissions come from transportation, the tramway will play a key role in achieving climate targets.

With a joint Canada-Quebec investment of nearly \$200 million, rigorous studies will ensure optimal planning. Given the projected 76% population increase in Gatineau's west end by 2051, this project represents a sustainable vision for our region.




## Supporting Our Farmers to Grow a Stronger Economy and Protect Our Land

Agriculture is a pillar of our economy and essential for food security and environmental stewardship.

This year, I had the honour of leading a discussion on these issues with Minister Marie-Claude Bibeau at the beautiful Little Red Wagon vineyard in Shawville, Quebec. Through collaboration with the Pontiac Chamber of Commerce and the Union des producteurs agricoles (UPA), we brought together local entrepreneurs and farmers to address key issues such as fair pricing, incentives for buying local, support for Canadian beef producers, and ways to encourage and support the next generation of farmers.

I would like to thank farmers across Pontiac-Kitigan Zibi who welcomed me to their farms and helped me better understand their unique challenges. Over the last three years, I have visited many farms across the region and met over 100 farmers. These constructive visits include Glad Crest Farms, a beautiful dairy farm in Shawville with a longstanding engagement in the community; Ferme Stérido in Luskville, a family-run dairy farm with a longstanding tradition in Holstein breeding; Ferme Edward O'Brien in Chapeau, a multi-generational family farm with unique sustainable crop cultivation practices; RM Lang Farm in Shawville, known for its large-scale crop cultivation and farming services; Les Serres Paul Amyotte, a greenhouse operation specializing in fresh, local produce; and Ferme Danis in Montcerf-Lytton, focused on high-quality beef production.

Through these visits, I gained valuable insights into the needs and aspirations of our region's farming community. This experience enriches my work as Chair of the Rural Caucus, allowing me to drive essential discussions on food security and advocate for measures that strengthen Canada's agricultural capacity, providing better support for those who feed our communities.

- Mon équipe et moi avons soutenu plus de **520** dossiers de citoyens, apportant de l'aide sur des questions liées à Immigration, Réfugiés et Citoyenneté Canada; à l'Agence du revenu du Canada; à Service Canada; au système de paie Phénix, et bien d'autres.

- I sent out **6** program bulletins to keep community leaders informed about new programs.
- I completed **55** program research requests to support various initiatives and projects in the riding.
- I responded personally and substantially to over **1000** of your correspondences, ensuring your voices are heard.
- My team and I have supported over **520** citizen files, assisting with issues related to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada; Canada Revenue Agency; Service Canada; the Phoenix pay system, and more.

## Points saillants de nos investissements dans la circonscription

## Highlights of our investments in our region

We have funded more than **30** incredible projects in the riding, boosting local innovation and economic growth. Key investments among these include:

- Nearly **\$100 million** invested in the preparatory phase of the Gatineau Tramway project.
- **\$5 million** through the Rapid Housing Initiative for the Habitants at the Heart of the Valley project in Gracefield.
- **\$2 million** investment to the Kidjimaninan Project, an Anishinabeg led Regional Biodiversity Protection.
- **\$35 million** to the City of Gatineau for road work on Pink Road and La Vérendrye Boulevard
- **\$1 million** in various grants for the Canada Summer Jobs Program throughout the riding
- **\$500,000** in collaboration with the Federation of Canadian Municipalities for the Horizons Partagés project led by CREDDO.
- **\$350,000** in active transportation in the Outaouais region.
- **\$303,528** in federal funding through the New Horizons for Seniors Program for 16 projects spread across the riding.
- **\$6.4 million** dedicated to student housing at the Université du Québec en Outaouais.
- **\$100,000** to support tourism development at Chalets Prunella in Thorne (Ladysmith).
- **\$100,000** through CED to support Samonix Inc. in Litchfield for preliminary studies in land-based salmon aquaculture.
- **\$200,000** through CED to support a biomedical company in Gatineau.
- **\$250,000** through CED to support tourism development at HOM Mini Chalets.
- **\$207,500** through CED to support the tourism development project of Chelsea Square.
- **\$200,000** through CED to support the development of Chelsea & Co Microbrasserie.
