The road ahead will be hard, but it will also be ours to shape, together.





## At our National Caucus Retreat, Prime Minister Mark Carney outlined the seven missions of our government:

- Build a new economic and security relationship with the United States and expand trade in Europe and Asia.
- Launch nation-building projects and a Climate Competitiveness Strategy.
- Lower costs: tax relief, affordable child care, dental and pharmacare.
- Make housing affordable through Build Canada Homes.
- Protect sovereignty: Armed Forces pay raise, defence at 2% GDP, safer communities.
- Reset immigration: reduce temporary residents, attract top global talent.
- Spend less, streamline government, unlock private capital.

And these priorities are already in action!





### **Build Canada Homes: Building Faster, More Affordable, Here in the Outaouais**

Canada is facing a housing crisis. Too many families – especially young people – are struggling to find an affordable place to call home. That is why Prime Minister Mark Carney launched **Build Canada Homes**, a new federal agency that will change the way we build and access housing.



With an initial investment of \$13 billion, Build Canada Homes has a mandate to build at scale, quickly and sustainably. It will make use of federal lands, modern construction methods such as prefabricated housing, and work in partnership with provinces, municipalities, and Indigenous communities to deliver concrete results. Already, six priority sites – including Ottawa – will see the construction of 4,000 homes, with potential for up to 45,000 homes across the country.

Build Canada Homes also responds directly to homelessness. In Gatineau, where the number of people experiencing homelessness has increased by **268% since 2018**, the new supportive and transitional housing units could provide homes for up to **one in five people** currently without shelter.

By combining investment, public land, and innovation, we are building a stronger and more affordable Outaouais – and making the right to a home a reality.

### Major Projects Office – Exciting News for Pontiac-Kitigan Zibi

The Prime Minister announced the first priority projects supported by the new Major Projects Office (MPO), which fast-tracks projects of national importance by streamlining approvals and supporting financing.

For our region, the **Alto High-Speed Train** is a historic breakthrough. Connecting Toronto to Quebec City, with a stop in Ottawa and Montreal, it will cut travel times in half, inject billions into the economy, and create tens of thousands of jobs. For Pontiac–Kitigan Zibi, it means faster access to urban centres, more visitors to boost tourism, and opportunities for workers and entrepreneurs.

Quebec will benefit from the expansion of the **Port of Contrecœur**, which will strengthen the flow of goods, boost competitiveness of our businesses, and create lasting economic growth.

The West Wind Atlantic Energy project will tap into Quebec's clean energy potential, powering our communities and opening opportunities for exports to the United States.

Together, these projects put Quebec, and Pontiac-Kitigan Zibi, at the heart of Canada's clean energy future and ensure our region plays a key role in building national prosperity.





## Strategic Response to Tariffs – Delivering for Pontiac–Kitigan Zibi

In September, our Prime Minister announced new measures to support the families, workers, and communities of Pontiac–Kitigan Zibi affected by the tariffs. These include:

- \$1 billion for SMEs More support for SMEs, sawmills, and agri-food producers with financing tools through Canada Economic Development to help keep jobs here at home.
- \$5 billion Strategic Response Fund –
   Providing relief to tariff-impacted industries
   like forestry, agriculture, and manufacturing
   to retool, pivot to new markets, and maintain
   good jobs in our region.
- Extra El benefits and training –
   Long-tenured workers, particularly in forestry
   and manufacturing, will gain up to 65 weeks
   of benefits, plus training and counselling
   to strengthen skills and transition into good
   jobs.
- Enhanced Agri-marketing funding –
   A \$75 million top-up to help farmers promote
   Canadian products abroad, diversify markets,
   and support long-term growth including for
   producers in Pontiac–Kitigan Zibi.
- New Buy Canada Policy Requiring federal agencies to buy – a measure with real impact in our region – Canadian will strengthen supply chains, directly support food processors, sawmills, and local suppliers, and create new opportunities for Canadian businesses.



#### Highlights from the Agriculture Ministers' Conference

In September, I joined the Honourable Heath MacDonald, Minister for Agriculture and Agri-Food at the Federal-Provincial-Territorial Conference of Agriculture Ministers in Winnipeg. Agriculture is at the heart of our region's identity and economy. From family farms to agri-food businesses, our producers work tirelessly to put food on our table.

I am grateful for the opportunity to serve as Parliamentary Secretary for Agriculture and Agri-Food, which enabled me to bring the concerns of Pontiac–Kitigan Zibi's farmers and producers directly to the national table, where we addressed key issues:

#### Building Resilience

Our producers need programs that are adapted to today's challenges. With climate change, wildfires, and global trade uncertainty affecting farms, we are working to strengthen risk management tools and modernize infrastructure.

#### Growing Markets

Ministers agreed on measures to support innovation and diversify international markets. For our region, this means opening doors for farmers and agri-food producers to reach new buyers, increase the value of their products, and strengthen Pontiac–Kitigan Zibi's role in Canada's agri-food economy.

#### Cutting Red Tape

Too often, producers tell me that bureaucracy slows them down.
That is why I emphasized the importance of the **federal Red Tape Review**.

By simplifying and modernizing agricultural rules, we reduce paperwork without lowering safety or food standards, giving farmers more time to focus on what truly matters: their businesses, their families, and their future.
